

'We are prophets of a future not our own'



This phrase is part of a reflection often attributed to Archbishop Romero, now canonised, or to Bishop Untener, a fellow prelate of Romero's. It is one which causes us to think deeply. We like to think that we are working towards a better world for our children or for those we love. And yet that future passes into other hands and we must leave it to a new generation. All we can hope is that they will know how to take it forward for the betterment of all

In this period of Lent, after the celebration of St. Patricks feast day, and, as we prepare over these last weeks to relive again the passion and death of Christ, we may ponder how their lives on Earth have shaped our future.

Patrick came to bring the Word of Salvation to a pagan people. He came to sow seeds for the future, to encourage a people to live the Gospel message in their lives. Christ, at His death on the Cross, left to His disciples the task of telling the world of God's

love, and of that great commandment, to love God and one another.

Each contributing to a future left to us to build.

When we look at our own lives, all we can think of perhaps, is how far we have come, how much we have achieved, and even what legacy we leave behind. These reflections are always positive since as Christians, it is always our hope and our duty not to have left misery and hardship for people in the future. In this testament of ours, we also recognise that Christ asked us to build a future of love and kindness, a kingdom of godliness.

Our hearts must be content, if we have laboured, honestly, since we have only been workers, not the master builder. We are like those workers in Barcelona, who one hundred years later attempt to make the great Cathedral of the Holy Family in the image which its architect, Gaudi, wished to create.

Christ left only one template, His life and death and those words which he expressed in the beatitudes, in the temple, and in all His dealings with everyone He influenced. As we journey to meet Him these are the measuring rods that will mark how well we worked in His vineyard.

When the German theologian, Dietrich Bonhoeffer was faced with the huge challenge of participating in the resistance to the Nazi regime, after much prayer and thought he did so for the future of German society because, "The ultimate test of a moral society is the kind of world that it leaves to its children."



The Golden legend of Martha and Mary



Mary of Magdala and Martha, were sisters of Lazarus, whom Jesus raised from the dead. They were wealthy, influential Jews. Lazarus owned the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus started His Passion. Their relationship is well documented in the Bible and they were passionate and fervent followers of Jesus, as were all the servants of their households. They were active in preaching Christ's message and in baptising people. Mary moved in influential circles and while she was deemed to be "free with her favours." with some people, she was not a prostitute, which the Pharisees described her as, in order to deniarate

Because of their standing in society, their devotion to Jesus was an embarrassment to the Pharisees, but because of that status, the Pharisees could not execute them. Instead. along with their servants and other disciples, they herded them onto boats in the Mediterranean, without food, water, oars or sails, in the expectation of them being overcome by the elements.

Instead, the Lord guided them safely to the south coast of France, to a port , near Marseille, which is now known as "Saintes Marie de la Mers," or "Holy Marys of the seas," where they immediately started preaching and converting the locals to Christianity. The rest of their history can be read on the Internet, except that Mary subsequently spent the next 30 years in a cave on the side of a mountain. praying and allegedly receiving Holy Communion daily, at the hands of an Angel. In her last days, she did come down from her cave to St. Maximum. who had been a servant in her house, who gave her Holy Communion, before she died. There is a cathedral named after him in the area, where he is known as "Maximum-Le Sainte Baum", as well as a Basilica dedicated to Mary Magdalene, who was also known as the "Apostle of Apostles". The care of the holy sites has been entrusted to the Dominican order

Currently, there are three Dominican priests there, with a Dublin man, Fr. James Holmes being in overall charge. He credits Medjugorje with being the source of his vocation to the priesthood.

SLOW COOKED BEEF

Inaredients:

Ingredients

1kg. Stewing beef cut into 2cms. pieces

60gms. (2ozs.) flour

35 ml. Cooking Oil

1 Onion – chopped

85gms. (2½ozs.) Tomato puree.

120 ml. Red wine (small wine glass)

225ams, potatoes,

peeled and cut linch chunks

200gms. (7ozs.) Baby Carrots

500ml. Beef Stock (2 Beef Stock Cube)

½ teaspoon of salt

1 teaspoon thyme leaves

70gms. (3ozs.) Frozen peas (Thawed)

Method:

- 1. Coat beef in the flour-Heat half the oil in a large frying pan over a medium heat – Brown the meat in batches, turning to make sure all sides are browned - transfer to a Pyrex dish.
- 2. Add the onions to the pan with the cooking oil. Cook over a medium heat for 10 mins until tender, stir in tomato puree and transfer to the Pyrex dish.
- 3. Pour the wine into the pan and scrape up any browned bits - add to the dish - stir in the potatoes, carrots, beef stock, salt and thyme.
- 4. Cover and cook on high heat for two hours or cook on low heat for 3½ hours.

Add the peas and heat for a further few minutes Enjoy

MARINO P.P.C. REPORT DECEMBER 2019

In 2016 the PPC undertook a 3 year cycle of projects that were proposed by Parishioners under the headings of House Visiting, Communications, Liturgy, Adult Faith-Formation, and Grouping Issues

The members responsible for each of these projects have written a summary of their activities and results below.

House Visiting - Yvonne Walsh - As part of my role on the PPC I was asked if I would look into forming a visitation group for people living on their own. I inquired from other people who had previously tried doing this. I went to the Tuesday Club and asked the members if they would be interested in people calling for a chat and a cup of tea. Cross Care initiated a diocesan wide pilot project called Befriending. This initiative was very successful. However Cross Care did not have enough staff to continue to support this. Cross Care now work in partnership with Alone to organize home visits. As a member of the Vincent De Paul doing home visitations to people living on their own, I mentioned the visitation group to them. Alas the visitation group did not happen as I felt people did not want strangers calling to their home, they would prefer close family and friends to visit them. Please remember your elderly family friends and neighbours all the year round. Remember we will all be older one day and we will need our family, friends and neighbours.

Communications - Tom Raleigh, Mary Shiel, Helen Swan and Mary Dillon. The team focussed on reinvigorating the parish website. Following evaluation of several web designers, one (Graphedia) was chosen and the updated website was launched in 2017. Thank you to Tom and Helen for many hours of work in fine tuning the contents of the pages. The website continues to be supported by the Parish Office, Tom Raleigh and Mary Dillon. www.marinoparish.ie

Liturgy - Mary Kirk (Pastoral Parish Worker) and Kathleen Ryan, initially, set up the group along with **Fr. Tom and Georgina Dowling.** The group has been self-sustaining and is now an integral part of Marino Parish. The report below is written on behalf of the Liturgy team by Georgina Dowling.

Each season the Liturgy Group reflects a different face of God. We started the beginning of the year with:

11th February 2019: Our Lady of Lourdes Feast Day. We organise the Statue of Our Lady of Lourdes and the Novena prayer and the Flower Ladies look after the wonderful display of flowers around the Statue.

17th March 2019: St. Patrick's Day. We have a picture of St. Patrick and we organised a Sacred Space around the picture, with a bowl of shamrock and dressed with green material and the Irish Flag.

Easter: The dates change each year however, last year Lent started on 6th March 2019, and we were involved in the Stations of the Cross after the 10.00am Mass each Friday during Lent.

Fr. Alex Stenson gave 4 Lenten Talks in preparation for Easter. A Sacred Space was set up on a table at the foot of the Altar. The crucifix, Bible and candle were displayed, and the Bible was turned each day of Lent in order that the parishioners could reflect on the readings of each day.

A Penitential Service for Easter was on 15th April 2019 and we were involved in the lituray.

Holy Thursday: Two parishioners from the parish were invited to attend the Chrism Mass in the Pro- Cathedral. We organized 12 parishioners to participate in the washing of the feet.

Adoration was at the Altar of repose, closing with the Night Prayer led by the Liturgy Team.

We had tremendous help from the PPC and the parishioners in the distributing of our Easter Candles.

We have organized the following: A series of Advent talks for Christmas, The Sacred Space for Penitential Service for Advent. We have a beautiful picture of the prodigal Son which will is used for this event.

We look forward to 2020 for a new beginning and to touch into the needs of different groupings and the wider parish community.

Adult Faith formation - Sr. Marie Cunningham and Mary Kirk initiated this team. Activities such as Lenten Retreats, Weeks of prayer at Lent, Lecto Divina, ceremonies of renewal of the Ministers of the Word at Pentecost and lectures by Fr. Stenson and others have been incorporated into the work of the Liturgy team.

Grouping (Cluster) Activities - Donnycarney, Fairview and Marino form a Parish Grouping (Cluster) in the Fingal South East Deanery area. The parishes share information and best practice on a wide range of common issues through the monthly Deanery meetings.

Projects- The PPC has a role in initiating, managing and supporting projects that benefit the parishioners such as Parish Child Protection and Vulnerable Adult Volunteer Vetting programme, GDPR Legislation and introduction of Parish child Protection and Vulnerable Adult Training meetings. The PPC would like to extend our thanks to the conscientious and dedicated Child Protection Team in this parish.

MEMORIES OF BRIAN AVENUE.

For a long time I have talked about the old days in Brian Avenue so finally I have decided to sit down and remember. The first memory was the sounds of children playing, the sound of people walking to and from the church and from the shops, the voices seemed to carry in a way it no longer does. I think there was only one car belonging to rich Mr. Hayes. As women were not employed outside the home there seemed to be women chatting to each other. In most houses there were children mostly big families. So, you were always sure of someone to come out to play. Collop's' wall was used to play all sorts of ball games. We played for hours with a skipping rope with little rhymes the words of which I still remember. If you had a scooter you could fly along between the path and the road, you could kick the can for hours on end. But the jewel in the crown was the back field. There were endless hours of enjoyment there.

The boys marked their territory by digging holes and putting makeshift roofs with notices saying, "GIRLS KEEP OUT". There were fires lit and potatoes roasted which tasted wonderful. Blackened from the fire they were balls of lovely tasting spuds the likes of which 1 have not tasted since. My

mother reminded me they had been dug up from a plot belonging to my father. We used to spend hours playing there and this was fondly remembered recently at a funeral of one of my old friends. His brother gave the eulogy remembering these days, told so movingly that we cried and laughed as his memories were so lovingly recounted.

As I look out my window most of the old neighbours are gone or their families have emigrated years ago. I refer to McElroy's, though the house has been sold and people whose names I don't know have started their own lives. But the names of Brogans, whose Family were almost an extension of our own home. Gerrards. Lavertys, Gibsons and Fullams their children are part of my past. McElroy's was great as Bobby ran a zoo of sorts with chickens, rabbits, dogs and cats which were on show. You had to pay to see them with buttons if you had Galvins no money. were entrepreneurs before their time Danny who organised dances in the Carlton Hall and was an accomplished musician, lived next door. He emigrated to Canada from which for 40 years he kept in touch at Christmas, and recently died. They were very much a part of growing up as were Berminahams whose children returned from America as their father had been involved in 1916 and had received the usual invitations to the commemoration They were anxious to see the back field which of course has disappeared and has been divided up and gardens extended many years ago. Our house was not included as the back field was not directly behind our house. As I remember the past, I must acknowledge the kindness of the new generation who have moved in. Whenever I needed help, they have been there quietly helping.

Life has changed and, in many ways, life is more difficult for young couples who need to work outside the home. Maybe I see the past through rose coloured glasses I nearly forgot to speak about Jim Mulkerns who

looked like Rhett Butler in "Gone with the Wind". He became a famous movie maker. But life moves on and these are just memories which in a way are Gone with the Wind Brian Avenue has changed, and it is no longer safe to play on the road as we did. 1 can only wish the younger generation to be happy in their new world as we were many years ago., Nuala Flynn
